Message from Pastor Mike

This Advent, I have been focusing my prayers and my opportunities for meditation and contemplation on what I think might be *the* virtue most sorely lacking in many of our lives: *peace*. With the already-hectic pace of life suddenly amplified by the hustle and bustle of the holidays, peace and peacefulness often feel like the last thing on offer. This makes sense: after all, there's not much money-making opportunity in joyful stillness, and

anyway, it doesn't seem likely that we will ever figure out how to buy our way to inner contentment regardless. The kind of peace that really has value must be forged, cultivated in the spirit and the heart—no easy task when a thousand-and-one other items on the to-do list keep it from being a priority.

This is a shame, because so much of the story of Christmas is grounded in a deep sense of rest, calm, and peacefulness. Remarkably, this story manages to pull this off despite the undeniable violence and

instability that greeted Jesus at his birth, with the Massacre of the Innocents and the subsequent need for the Holy Family to flee their homeland as refugees demonstrating how fragile and precious peace can really be. Scripture doesn't ignore this troubling context—instead, it transforms it, depicting the birth of Jesus as a sudden, radical infusion of peace, hope and joy in a world that desperately needs all three. It's a reminder of the tremendous power of fostering tranquility, even when, especially when, the world feels particularly overwhelming.

Just as we put our faith and trust in the Prince of Peace, let us put our faith in the power of peace this Advent season. Here's one possible way to do that: research says just five minutes of silent meditation/prayer can have remarkable calming and soothing effects. This Advent, I hope you can join me in taking at least five minutes a day to work on your inner peace-making skills. I encourage you to make this part of a devotional if you're up for it—for instance, I chant a psalm, read the appointed daily scripture passages, and then repeat a simple one- or two-word phrase to focus my mind on my breathing, but you can take your own approach! Hopefully, by the time Christmas arrives, you'll be ready to joyfully greet Jesus, knowing that a peaceful and loving heart is the best way to celebrate the season.

The Season of Advent

"**Advent**" means "coming" or "arrival."

During the season of Advent, we celebrate Christ's coming into the world and watch with expectant hope for His coming again.

In its historical origins, the season of Advent was patterned after the season of Lent, a six-week period of penitence and preparation for Easter. Similarly, the four weeks of Advent present an opportunity for communal discernment and personal examination, as we prepare to celebrate the Nativity of the Lord and looks with hope for Christ's return.

During **Advent**, candles are lit each **Sunday** on the Advent Wreath, each symbolizing different themes of the season:

- 1. First Sunday of Advent (Dec 1): The purple candle symbolizes **HOPE.** Also called the "Prophecy Candle" in remembrance of the prophets, especially Isaiah, who foretold Christ's birth. It represents anticipation of the coming Messiah and the salvation He brings.
- 2. Second Sunday of Advent (Dec 8): The **purple candle** represents **FAITH** and is called the "Bethlehem Candle," recalling Micah's prophecy of the Messiah's birth in Bethlehem and Mary and Joseph's journey there.
- 3. Third Sunday of Advent (Dec 15): The pink candle symbolizes **JOY** and is called the **"Shepherd's Candle,"** celebrating the joy of the shepherds upon hearing the angels' announcement of Jesus' birth. This is **Gaudete Sunday**, a day of rejoicing.
- 4. Fourth Sunday of Advent (Dec 22): The purple candle symbolizes **PEACE** and is called the **"Angel's Candle,"** representing the peace Jesus brings, reconciling people with God and each other.
- 5. Christmas Day: The white center candle, known as Christ's Candle, represents light and purity, symbolizing Christ's sinlessness and His central role in our lives.

Each candle highlights a **different aspect** of the Advent season, leading to the celebration of Christ's birth.

FEATURED RECIPE: TURKEY POT PIE

(A delicious way to use up those left-overs!)



INGREDIENTS

- 2 cups frozen peas and carrots
- 2 cups frozen green beans
- 1 cup sliced celery
- ²/₃ cup butter
- ²/₃ cup diced onion
- ²/₃ cup all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon ground black pepper
- ½ teaspoon celery seed
- ½ teaspoon onion powder
- ½ teaspoon Italian seasoning
- 1 ³/₄ cups chicken broth
- 1 1/3 cups milk
- 4 cups cubed leftover cooked turkey
- 2 (14.1 ounce) packages pastry for a 9-inch double-crust pie

Directions

- 1. Gather the ingredients. Preheat the oven to 425 degrees F (220 degrees C).
- 2. Place frozen peas, carrots, and beans in a saucepan with celery; add enough water to cover and bring to a boil. Reduce heat to medium-low and simmer until celery is tender, about 8 minutes. Drain.
- 3. While vegetables are simmering, melt butter in a saucepan over medium heat. Add onion and cook until translucent, about 5 minutes. Add flour, salt, pepper, celery seed, onion powder, and Italian seasoning and whisk until a paste forms, about 1 minute. Slowly whisk in chicken broth and then milk until incorporated; bring to a simmer and cook, whisking constantly, until sauce thickens, 3 to 5 minutes.
- 4. Remove thickened sauce from the heat; add cooked, drained vegetables and cubed turkey and stir until filling is well combined.
- 5. Set out two 9-inch pie dishes. Fit one pie pastry into the bottom of each dish. Spoon 1/2 of the pot pie filling into each dish, then lay remaining pie pastries over top. Pinch and roll the top and bottom pastries together at the edges to seal. Use a sharp knife to cut several small slits in each top pastry to allow steam to release while cooking. Place pies on baking sheets.
- 6. Bake in the preheated oven for 15 minutes. Check the top crusts for browning; if they are browning too quickly, cover with aluminum foil. Continue to bake until the crusts are golden brown and the filling is bubbly, 15 to 20 more minutes.
- 7. Remove from the oven and cool for 10 minutes before serving.
- 8. Serve and enjoy!

How to Store Turkey Pot Pie

Allow the turkey pot pie to cool completely, then transfer it to an airtight container. Store in the refrigerator for three to four days.

Can You Freeze Turkey Pot Pie?

Yes, you can freeze turkey pot pie leftovers for up to four months. Thaw in the refrigerator and reheat in the microwave or in the oven.




